## Spotlight Theme: The Rule Of Law

While the rule of law can be subject to varying interpretations, it is crucial that key stakeholders, young leaders included, cultivate their understanding of the underlying values commonly associated with the concept while appreciating the complex nature of the rule of law both as a concept and in practice. Through the presentation and sharing of policy experiences among their peers, participants will be able to approach the rule of law in the contexts that are relevant to their work and their lives, while appreciating the multiple factors that influence and shape the rule of law discourse.

## At a Glance: Workshop Format

The TIJ Workshop focuses on peer-to-peer learning and the necessary skills for understanding the policies and initiatives that affect their lives and the world at large, while drawing upon the rule of law as a guiding framework.

Participants will have opportunities to:

- Learn from experts during the **Plenary Lectures** who will present their views on engaging topics related to global law and policy
- Join the **Policy Skill Teams** and share their practical or policy experiences, explore contemporary issues and literature about relevant topics to the rule of law and draw good practices and innovative approaches
- Participate in the **TIJ-IGLP Policy Streams** where interactive mini-courses are offered by the IGLP network faculty to review current scholarly developments and engage in case-based learning
- Cultivate their skills in offering feedback, presenting experiences of their peers and synthesizing their own thoughts in a concrete policy discourse
- Join the **Field Trip** and experience policy development at work
- Present their views and concluding thoughts in a **Public Forum** organized by the TIJ

# CURRICULUM DETAILS

## I. Plenary Sessions

The plenary sessions of the Workshop will feature presentations, lectures or panel discussions by accomplished experts from various fields who will provide participants with insight into the policy spheres at various levels and the underlying concepts of the rule of law. It will also serve as an overview on the nexus between the rule of law and sustainable development and instill a basic understanding of the rule of law to the participants.

## II. Policy Skills Teams

During the Policy Skills Teams, participants will be mentored and coached by renowned faculty members from the Institute for Global Law and Policy (IGLP) at Harvard Law School who will facilitate thematic discussions and encourage interactive learning through drawing from experiences of the participants and integrating them into a policy proposal that addresses issues relevant to their works.

Participants will be assigned two topics out of the four offered which will serve as the overall theme for discussion:

**TOPIC 1**  
Criminal Justice  
System Reform and  
Implementation in  
Developing Societies

**TOPIC 2**  
Good Governance in  
the Public and Private  
Sectors

**TOPIC 3**  
Informality,  
Development and  
the Challenge of

**TOPIC 4**

Each topic will be covered in two sessions over the course of two days. Participants will receive a reading list and preparatory materials prior to the session.

During the first session, participants will engage in an in-depth discussion covering the current and pressing issues relating to the topic after the introductory presentation by the mentors. The aim is to provide an overview of all the relevant issues on the topic to participants in order to prepare for further discourse and analytical exercises related to the topic on the second day.

During the second session, participants will work in pairs to exchange and share their own views and practical experiences relating to the topic. The purpose of this session is to collect feedback and challenges so that the participants can later collaborate and brainstorm ideas for suggested policy practices and solutions.

Following the four Policy Skills Sessions (under the selected two topics), the faculty will host a **wrap-up** session to synthesize key conclusions and takeaways from the discussion.

The primary goal of these Policy Skills Sessions is to encourage participants to revisit their understanding of the rule of law and to enhance their knowledge by widening their perspectives on their issues of interest while exposing them to the issues outside of their practices.

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### III. TIJ-IGLP Policy Streams

The TIJ-IGLP Policy Streams seek to equip participants with a wide range of knowledge and perspectives by enhancing the nuanced understanding of the conceptual frameworks that link together the concept of the rule of law and policy. Participants will be coached to analyze the abstract concept of the rule of law in terms of tangible practices in real-world situations. Each TIJ-IGLP Policy Stream will meet 3 times – twice as lecture-style learning sessions and concluding with a case-based session.

Participants will choose two streams based on their interest and preference. The topics of the policy streams are as follow:

Finance and Development:  
The Silk Road Economic Belt initiative

Labor and Migration in a Transnational Economy

Distribution and Regulation in the Transnational Economy

Law and Development

### IV. Preparatory Session and Presentation at Public Forum

Following all the aforementioned sessions, participants will receive the opportunity during a **preparatory breakout session** to derive and synthesize their discussions and findings to identify key themes with regards to the possible approaches in mainstreaming the rule of law into practical policy initiatives. Selected participants from each of the policy skills sessions will be invited to present the key findings at the Public Forum to be organized in conjunction with the Workshop, which will take place on the last day of the Workshop on Wednesday, January 11.

### V. The Public Forum

The final output of the Workshop will be a presentation at a Public Forum on the last day of the Workshop. Key topics that should be covered in this presentation include the importance of the rule of law in enhancing the operational environment across all sectors and how it can be incorporated to guide business transactions and decision-making at all levels. The session will also feature policy recommendations covering innovative solutions for the practical application of the rule of law. Representatives will be encouraged to select a mode of presentation they think is most suitable for the content they wish to present.

### Kittipong Kittayarak

Executive Director  
Thailand Institute of Justice

Kittipong Kittayarak is the Executive Director of the Thailand Institute of Justice (TIJ), the host of the TIJ Workshop for Emerging Leaders on the Rule of Law and Policy. He is also a Professor of Law at the Faculty of Law, Chulalongkorn University. Prior to that, he has held several key public offices including the Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Justice where he helped engineer key reform initiatives including the restructuring of the Ministry of Justice, police reform, and mainstreaming restorative justice in Thailand. He was actively involved in the international campaign that results in the development and adoption of the new set of the United Nations standards and norms on women offenders. He also serves as an expert and panelist at key international fora including the United Nations Congress on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice.

Dr. Kittayarak earned his LL.B. from Chulalongkorn University, LL.M. from Cornell Law School and Harvard Law School, and J.S.D. from Stanford Law School. He is also a lecturer at a number of academic institutes in Thailand, including the Bar Association of Thailand.




### David Kennedy

David Kennedy is Manley O. Hudson Professor of Law and Faculty Director of the Institute for Global Law and Policy at Harvard Law School where he teaches international law, international economic policy, legal theory, law and development and European law since 1981. He holds a Ph.D. from the Fletcher School at Tufts University and a J.D. from Harvard. He is the author of numerous articles on international law and global governance. As a practicing lawyer and consultant, Professor Kennedy has worked on numerous international projects, both commercial and public, including work with various international organizations. He is past Chair and Member of the World Economic Forum's Global Advisory Council on Global Governance. In 2011, he was appointed Foreign Advisor to Thailand's Truth for Reconciliation Commission and now serves as a member of the Asian Peace and Reconciliation Commission.

At Harvard, he served as Chair of the Graduate Committee and Faculty Director of International Legal Studies. He founded the European Law Research Center at Harvard in 1991 and served continuously as its Faculty Director.



### Matti Joutsen

Matti Joutsen holds a doctorate in criminal law and is Director of the European Institute for Crime Prevention and Control, affiliated with the United Nations (HEUNI). He has long represented Finland at meetings of the United Nations, the Council of Europe and the European Union. He was the chief negotiator for Finland on the UN Convention against Transnational Organized Crime, the UN Convention against Corruption, and the mechanism for the review of implementation of the Corruption Convention. Dr. Joutsen has written some 200 articles, studies, and papers on crime prevention, criminal justice, comparative criminal law, and international cooperation.



# **DESCRIPTION FOR THE TOPICS OF POLICY SKILLS TEAMS**

## **1 Criminal Justice System Reform and Implementation in Developing Societies**

Sinja Graf (Germany) National University of Singapore  
Onur Ince (Turkey) Singapore Management University  
Osama Siddique (Pakistan) Law and Policy Research Network

Effective criminal justice reform thinking and implementation requires deep appreciation of national contextual realities as well as meaningful adaptation of what has proven to work well across national boundaries. In this workshop we will develop an analytical framework to examine reform projects from multiple lenses: historical, sociological, institutional, legal, geographical and knowledge/data focused. We will evaluate reform not only as a technocratic domain but equally as a political phenomenon and strategy. Informed by select international literature, our collaborative learning method will emphasize vital actual experiential insights from our diverse faculty as well as seasoned participants.

## **2 Good Governance in the Public and Private Sectors**

This team will explore the ways in which governance is performed in contemporary policy work. We will focus on the role of law in governance as a site of choice rather than a ready-made solution to significant policy challenges. The limits of law, the unintended consequences of law and the importance of legal arrangements which may be difficult to perceive – private, informal, foreign – will all be considered. We will focus on the understanding what constitutions can and cannot do against corruption.





### **3 Informality, Development and the Challenge of Inequality**

This team focuses on issues of economic development and income inequality. The sessions are designed as group exercises that combine policy planning with intensive legal analysis. Professionals working directly on concrete public policy projects will have the opportunity to share their intended objectives and the means available to them, from their perspective, for their implementation. These may include both the traditional tools of policy planning, such as national laws and legal institutions, as well as informal tools such as reliably consistent social practices, deliberate official inaction, and long-standing areas of legal non-regulation.

### **4 Science and Sustainability**

This team will focus on the relationships among science, technology, and political power in contemporary policy making. The modern state's capacity to produce and use scientific knowledge is significant both in the production and maintenance of political order and in shaping or justifying the choices faced by policy elites. We will focus on the role of scientific knowledge in policy-making oriented to environmental "sustainability."

## GENERAL INFORMATION

Applicants should be able to demonstrate how their role and personal achievements have impacted the field that they are in.

### Selection Criteria

- This is not an academic workshop and the target audience is policymakers and practitioners. Scholars may be admitted to the extent that they earn achievements from their working experience in government, public policy, civil society, economic development and the rule of law.
- Candidates must have at least 10-12 years of working experience.
- An important prerequisite for participation is that applicants must be proficient in English as all program materials, classes, and discussions are in English.

Please attach an essay (in PDF format) of at least 1,000 words but not exceeding 1,500 words describing a policy initiative in (1) of the (4) following topics from the Policy Skills Teams in which you were involved or which you witnessed.

The (4) topics you may choose from include:

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These essays might consider questions such as: What was the perceived problem? What solution or solutions were proposed? How did the context hinder or promote the initiative – allies? Opponents? Obstacles? How did law figure in the initiative? What did they take away from the experience?

Your essay will be shared with other Workshop participants. Participants' experiences will serve as a basis for several of our interactive sessions.
