# POLICY TEAMS: PEER TO PEER ENGAGEMENT

## **Collaborative policy analysis**

- Pairs: understanding someone else's policy initiative
- Teamwork: analyzing policy initiatives from the group
- Exercise: presenting a policy idea

# IN PAIRS: TODAY

**Interview one another** about the policy experience you brought for discussion:

## **Diagnosis:**

- What prompted the initiative? How was the problem defined? What constituencies demanded action?
- Choices: Alternative diagnoses?

## **The Proposal:**

- Explain the initiative: Why would this be helpful?
- Choices: Other options?

## **Implementation:**

- Map the terrain: Opportunities? Obstacles?
- Timing and urgency?
- Choices: Alternative pathways?



# AN APPROACH TO POLICY ANALYTICS

- **Diagnosis or Framing**
  - Alternative frames and diagnoses
- **Understanding the Proposal**
  - Identifying Choices
- **The Terrain for Implementation**
  - Resituating the initiative / alternative pathways

# LAW IN POLICY

- **Identifying the relevant law:**
  - Adjacent legal fields
  - Background norms (i.e. private law as public regulation)
- **Law as a point of choice:**
  - Comparison to illuminate alternatives
  - Alternatives within and among legal regimes
- **Law in Society**
  - Anticipating reactions, adjustments, appropriations
  - The informal sector, the tolerated residuum of non-compliance
- **Law as a part of the problem – as well as solution**
  - Entrenching opposition or path dependence
  - Channeling engagement unproductively
  - Narrowcasting the solution

# PROFESSIONAL SKILL: PRESENTING TO NON-SPECIALISTS

- Policy work is articulation:
  - a staffer briefs a boss;
  - a civil servant briefs a minister, presents to parliament or the press;
  - A businessman lobbies a legislator
  - An NGO presents a white paper to the press
- Strategy: what to include or leave out; how to frame the initiative

# THE IGLP PRESENTATION: THE KEY ELEMENTS

- **Opening statement:** frame the idea
  - One sentence positioning your idea for consideration.
- **Closing:** sharpen the take-away.
  - Why this is a good idea and what might be accomplished?
  - How might success here link to larger issues?
  - What choices do your audience now face?
  - Most crucial considerations / deadline for next steps

# THE IGLP PRESENTATION: THE MIDDLE

- 1. What is the diagnosis?** What problem or difficulty prompts the idea?
- 2. What is the idea exactly?** What are you proposing be done and who should do it?
- 3. How was the idea formulated?** What process was followed in its development?
- 4. Why and how would this help?**
- 5. Moving ahead.** Assess the obstacles and opportunities, allies and opponents most relevant for implementation.
- 6. Open issues and the space for decision**
